Parkview Referendum on the April 7 Ballot

Wisconsin is holding an election in just a few short days and Parkview has an operational referendum question on the ballot. The referendum question is asking to approve for Parkview to collect additional revenue in the amount of \$825,000 in 2020-21, \$1,025,000 in 2021-22 and \$1,150,000 in 2022-23. **Approving this referendum will not increase the school tax rate (mill rate) of the property tax.** Please make sure you get out and vote on April 7.

Below are answers to some common questions you may have about the referendum.

1. How is Parkview performing Academically?

Parkview School District was rated the #1 School District in Rock and Green Counties according to the WI Dept. of Public Instruction's State Report Card. The WI Dept. of Public Instruction annually rates every school district in the state. 2. What question is going to be on the April 7, 2020 Ballot?

Shall Parkview School District, Rock County, Wisconsin be authorized to exceed the revenue limit specified in Section 121.91, Wisconsin Statutes, by \$825,000 for the 2020-21 school year, by \$1,025,000 for the 2021-22 school year, and by \$1,150,000 for the 2022-23 school year, for non-recurring purposes consisting of technology and curriculum materials, educational programming, expenses associated with bus routes, and costs associated with recruiting and retaining staff?

Approving this referendum will not increase the school tax rate (mill rate) of the property tax. Please make sure you get out and vote on April 7.

3. Do I check "Yes" or "No" to support the referendum?

To support the referendum, select "Yes."

4. Doesn't Parkview already have an approved operational referendum?

The \$350,000 operating referendum that was approved in 2017 was for a period of three school years. The current referendum expires at the end of the current 2019-20 school year. The 2017 operational referendum expires at the end of the current school year and the Board is asking the community to approve a new referendum for three additional years.

5. What is Parkview's budget projection for 2020-21, 2021-22 and 2022-23?

It is difficult to project forward the District's budget without knowing the amount of state aid. Parkview will not know how much state aid will be provided until the third Friday in September. The projections below are using historical models along with conservative projections regarding state aid and enrollment.

2020-21 projected shortfall is \$921,000
2021-22 projected shortfall is \$1,011,000
2022-23 projected shortfall is \$1,463,000
3 year total projected shortfall \$3,395,000

6. What is the cause of Parkview's budget shortfall?

It is anticipated that Parkview will receive an average of 1.42% increase in revenue from 2020-2024, but expenses will increase an average of 2.5% over the same period. As a result, Parkview will not be able to cover expenses.

7. How much will my property taxes go up?

The April 7 Parkview Referendum **will not increase the school portion of the property tax** because the 2017-2020 referendum is expiring. Also, in 2018 and 2019 the District prepaid some interest from the 2014 building referendum. These prepayments have been reduced or eliminated for 2020.

8. How much will my taxes go down if the referendum is not approved?

If the referendum were not approved, the school portion of property tax on a \$100,000 home would drop \$177.00 for 2020-21. The taxes would go down an additional \$37.00 in 2021-22 and \$19.00 in 2022-23.

Remember, if the Referendum is approved, the school tax (mill rate) simply stays the same over the three-year period.

9. I live in a rental and do not own a home. What impact will the referendum have on me?

As a renter, the referendum will not impact your current lease. A successful referendum will positively impact the entire community by keeping the school district strong and viable. A quality school district is key to a quality community. Please make sure you get out and vote!

COVID-19 Initiates Virtual Education in the Parkview School District

On Friday, March 13 Governor Evers ordered all public schools closed in order to slow down the spread of COVID-19. While the initial order stated schools would be closed until April 3, the most recent order from the Governor stated schools are closed indefinitely. In light of how rapidly the virus is spreading, Parkview leadership is preparing for the possibility that we will not be able to return to normal classroom instruction until well after this school year is scheduled to end.

The Governor stated that schools like Parkview are not required to make up the time missed. While it is a relief that Parkview doesn't legally have to make up the 55 days we may miss, educationally it is not ideal for our students to miss almost a third of the school year. When school was ordered closed on March 13, the Parkview staff shifted into high gear to ensure that our students would not be denied the learning they are entitled to.

Parkview administration began prepping right away on the evening of March 13 and worked through the weekend to prepare a virtual learning plan. The admin team met all day on Monday, March 16 and again on March 17 with the Parkview Technology Specialists in preparation for providing professional development to the teaching staff Wednesday March 18. Parkview teachers came to school on March 18 and by the end of the day on March 20, a functional virtual learning plan was ready to implement.

Each Parkview student has a District issued iPad or Chromebook available to complete the virtual lessons. To complete these lessons, a student needs access to internet and unfortunately many areas of our District are without

reliable internet. Parkview is addressing the internet problem by distributing US Cellular internet hotspots so students can access the internet.

Each teacher developed a variety of online learning experiences that were shared with students on Friday, March 20. These learning experiences include many of the same activities and lessons that students would have completed if they were present in the classroom. The teachers are also using video conferencing software such as Zoom and Google Hangout to have live discussion with their students.

While nothing can replace the caliber of instruction a student receives when they are in a physical classroom, I am confident that the virtual instruction our students are receiving will fill the void nicely.

Virtual instruction is new for the teachers, students and parents but I'm confident we will succeed with this venture. Orfordville Public Library News***Libraries Close, Curbside and Online Service May Be Available***

Rock County, Wis. – March 17, 2020 – All Public Libraries in Rock County are temporarily closing their doors to patrons in attempts to help slow the spread of COVID-19. All Rock County and SHARE Consortium member libraries will be closed by Wednesday, March 18. Many are planning to reopen April 6, 2020, mirroring school closures; others are closed until further notice. Be sure to visit your library's website or Facebook page for updates.

Due dates of all materials originally due during these closures will be extended to April 8. No overdue fees will be accrued during this period of closure. Temporary cards obtained online will be good for 90 days (longer than usual) and will work with most online resources. All library cards set to expire in March, April, or May will now expire June 1 in order to allow patrons access to online materials.

Prom

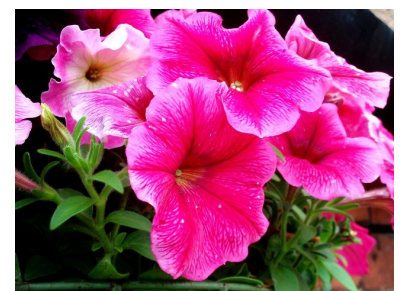
The 2020 Junior Prom is scheduled for Saturday, May 2 at the Janesville Country Club. The theme is Paris at Night.

“COVID-19 Google Tools for Successful Learning”

With COVID-19 taking over our school year, our district (amongst others) has been forced to go digital. As you pick up your child’s device from school, you may be asking yourself, “What are some of the necessary apps and tools he/she will be using?”. Allow me to introduce you to some of the most necessary apps in Google Suite! *

Google Drive- All your child’s work will be housed in a cloud known as Google Drive. Any work completed on Google will be automatically synced to their Drive, making it easier to access and manage.

Gmail- This is Google’s email service. To keep in contact with their teachers, Gmail should be checked daily. Each student is provided with a Gmail account, making it easy to keep track of.

Google Classroom- Google Classroom is a digital platform used in our district to organize materials and assignments. Your child’s teacher will use Google Classroom to present information to the class, allowing all the work to be in one space. GC can be downloaded on any IOS or Android device, as well as accessed through the Google homepage.

Google Hangouts- Google Hangouts, like Skype, allows students to video chat with their teacher to continue making a “face-to-face” connection. All the students in the class can be present in the chat at once, promoting communication and online collaboration.

Google Forms- Google Forms is an app used to create quizzes, surveys, or event registration sheets. Your child’s teacher will use Google Forms to take daily attendance, complete quick assessments, or even ask for input on a lesson.

Google Docs/Google Slides- Similar to Microsoft Word and PowerPoint, students will use Google Docs/Slides to create documents and slideshow presentations that will instantly save to their Google Drive. On these documents, multiple users can collaborate as well as provide feedback on assignments. Documents can be added to an assignment on Google Classroom, making it easier for teachers to check & grade.

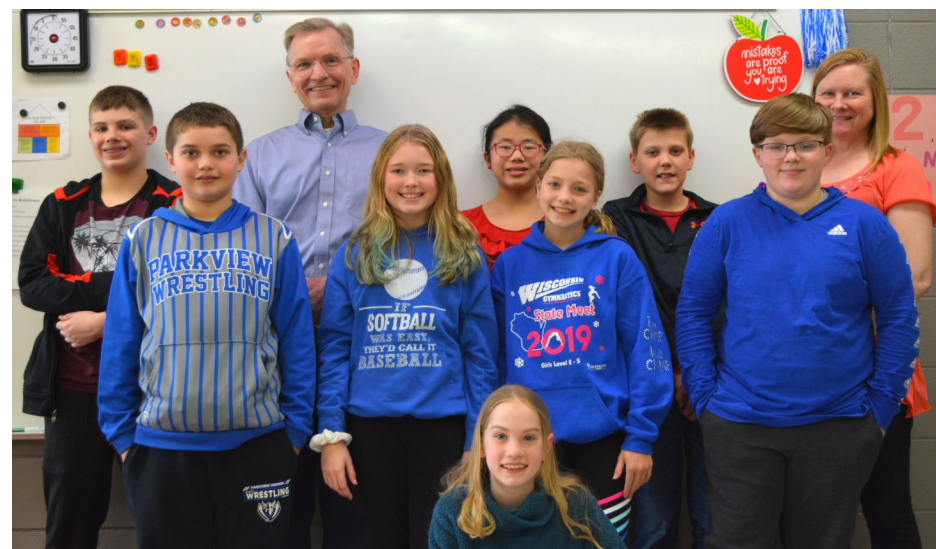

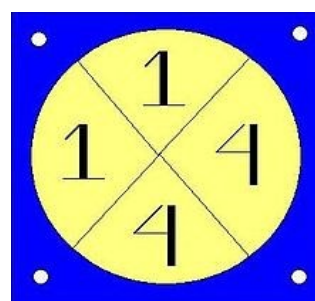

Slow Cooker Mac and Cheese

Serves 8

Ingredients

- 10 oz. elbow macaroni (or shells, spiral pasta, etc.)
- 1/2 stick butter, cubed
- 1 (12 oz.) can evaporated milk
- 1 1/2 cups whole milk
- 3 cups cheddar cheese, grated
- 1 cup parmesan cheese, grated, plus extra for garnish
- 1 cup Romano cheese, grated
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon freshly ground pepper
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- cooking spray

Directions

1. Spray a 4-quart slow cooker with cooking spray.
2. Place macaroni in slow cooker and add butter. Stir until butter is melted.
3. Add evaporated and whole milk, parmesan, Romano, cheddar cheese, nutmeg, and salt and pepper. Stir well.
4. Cover and cook on low for 3 hours. Stir well and sprinkle with parmesan and another dash of nutmeg, and serve hot.

Tip: If you don't have a slow cooker, put pasta, milk and cheeses in a large baking dish and bake for 50 minutes at 350° F.
