## Weather Related Delay \& Cancellation Procedures

Winter sure snuck up on us quickly so I felt this was a good time to communicate Parkview's weather-related delay and cancellation procedures.

For cold temperatures, the decision to delay or close school is based on the sustained wind chill forecast. A sustained wind-chill of -25 to -34 is when we begin to consider delaying or calling off school. This range falls within a Windchill Advisory and will be weighed with other factors to determine whether school will be delayed or cancelled. When a Windchill Warning goes into effect at -35 , school will be cancelled. In some cases, we may do a 2 -hour delay as the wind-chill temperature may increase as the sun comes up.

In preparation for these cold temperatures, please make sure your children are properly clothed. Even the buses may feel a little colder than normal in these types of temperatures. For those resident students that may walk to school throughout the year, it is especially important that they bundle up. Give yourself extra time to prepare for this decision.

As with all decisions, parents have the final decision of determining whether it is safe for their students to travel to school.

Closing or delaying school based on snow can be a bit more difficult to predict. Roads will be driven by school personnel on the morning in question to determine safety conditions. If winter weather conditions change during the day, an early release is possible and will be communicated via School Messenger, Facebook, Dojo and all of the local media outlets. Please note it is usually not practical to call off school the day

If Your Family Lives In Any Of The Following Situations:

- In a motel or campground due to the lack of an alternative adequate accommodation
- In a car, park, abandoned building, or bus or train station

Receive transportation to and from the school of origin, if you request this.
Receive educational services comparable to those provided to other students, according to your
children's needs.
If you believe your children may be eligible, contact the local liaison to find out what services
and supports may be available. There also may be supports available for your preschool-age chil-
dren.

before, given how unpredictable storms can be. In cases where school is delayed or canceled the goal is to communicate the decision by 6:00 a.m.

On days when school is cancelled, all activities on our campuses will be cancelled unless conditions drastically improve throughout the day allowing for safe travel. In these situations practice and/or games may be held with administrative approval.

Going out for recess is based on a sustained wind-chill of zero degrees. If it is zero or lower, students will not go out. If it is above zero students will typically go out for recess.

I hope this explanation helps in understanding the process used to make school closing decisions. "The AVCA presented the inaugural Thirty Under 30 Awards in 2009. This award was created to honor thirty of the up-and-coming volleyball coaches under 30 years old in the sport at all levels of the game. Although anyone can make a nomination, the nominee has to be an AVCA member. Rising active high school head coaches, high school assistant coaches, and high school junior varsity head coaches that are actively coaching for the 2019 high school season are eligible for nomination."

This is what was said about Coach Bunts in the press release from the AVCA: "Lindsey Bunts, Parkview High School (Orfordville, WI), Wisconsin Volleyball Coaches Association, "She worked on the basics until all it took was a clean pass, a quick set, and a fast, aggressive kill onto their opponent's side of the net. Welcome to Parkview Elementary School's new reading specialist Jodell Sadler. Her education includes: BA in Philosophy, Minors in Art, Bio-Chem, and Communication, MFA in Writing for Children \& Young Adults, EdD Curriculum \& Instruction Coursework. She also has certifications in K-12 Reading Specialist, Currently completing in WI, IL, K9, all subjects, and 4-12 ELA in IL, 1-8 and 412 ELA in WI, Technology: Webpage, Digital/Multimedia and Information Resources Design 7-12, Entrepreneurship/ Entrepreneurial Studies 7-12, and Commercial Art and Advertising 7-12 in IL, Art and Science, K-12 in IL, Forthcoming.
Sadler shared this information on her teaching experience prior to coming to PES. My teaching experience began long ago and I fell in love with teaching when I had my own children and ran a Pre-K Day Care. I hosted art (like spaghetti creations), computer fun (Math Mountain was a huge hit), science alive events (we studied Praying Mantis for 4 years among other experiments), and boosted math skills though gamifying learning, something I still to this day believe in. I strongly believe that passion and inspiring experiences leads to great learning in the classroom.

My more "official" teaching includes working as a One-on-One ELA and Reading Recovery, and Marketing/Business Teacher. I worked as an AP/Dual Credit AP Senior and Freshman English (Brit Lit and Writing and Rhetoric focus) Teacher while I traveled the US sharing my MFA (Master of Fine Arts) study on how pacing improves writing and reading in a snap. I've also worked as a 5th Grade ELA and Technology Teacher, and 8th Grade Entrepreneurship Teacher

On a Collegiate level, I've worked with students in Foundational ELA courses as well as Creative Writing, American Lit, College Comp, Advanced Composition, Lit of the American Minorities, Contemporary World Lit, American Lit and more. On a Grad Level, I've taught Writing Picture Books Course, Publishing, and Novel Writing, to name a few. I've also taught professional authors and illustrators, which helped them shorten their journey to the bookshelf.

During this time, I've furthered my research on my MFA critical thesis on Pacing to include all grade levels and KidLit Writing genres: Board Books, Picture Books, Chapter Books, Middle Grades and Young Adults as well as poetry and writing texts.

## Did you Know...? Pomegranate

The pomegranate is a fruit that contains hundreds of edible seeds called arils. They are rich in fiber, vitamins, minerals and bioactive plant compounds, but they also contain some sugar.
The punicalagins in pomegranate juice have been shown to reduce inflammation, one of the leading drivers of many serious diseases, including cancer and diabetes.
Regular intake of pomegranate juice has been shown to lower blood pressure levels in as little as two weeks.
As a rich source of nitrates, pomegranate may improve exercise performance by increasing blood flow.
Some evidence shows that pomegranate may improve memory in older adults and post-surgery. In addition, studies in mice suggest that it may protect against Alzheimer's disease.
