## Parkview School District Registration 2019-2020

Beginning on July 22, 2019, families will be able to register their students for the upcoming school year by following the necessary steps online through their Family Access (Skyward) account. A tutorial is available on the website that can be used to help families complete all of the steps that are part of the online registration process. Online registration will have the same format as last year so hopefully most families will be familiar with the process.

In order to encourage families to register their students in a timely manner, the usual online payment fee of $\$ 2.00$ per transaction through RevTrak will again be waived during the registration period from July 22nd - August 9th.

Assistance with the online registration will be available on the following days at both schools:

- July 22nd - July 25th - 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m.
- July 29th - August 1st - 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. - August 5th - August 9th - 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. (After August 9th, please contact your building secretary to set-up a time to come in to get assistance).

For those that need assistance outside of our day time hours; we will have staff available at both schools on August 5th (Noon - 7 p.m.) We will have staff members help you register using computers provided by the district and will follow the exact same steps as families who register online at home or at another off-site location using their Family Access (Skyward) account.

## Food for Thought

This will be my last article on "Food For Thought." After 32 years I have decided to retire. With that investment in time to the District's Food Service I shall take liberty to share with you the journey we have taken.

The journey started in March of 1987 when Donna Nolan (also retiring this year) transferred to custodian and left an opening in the Food Service Department I had been subbing for 3 years in the District in food service, as a secretary and as an instructional assistant prior to the time the full time position opened. I started at the high school and then went to Footville Elementary as a cook.

For a time the program was run by a management company, but that was short-lived. With the guidance of one of my mentors, District Administrator Don Albright, we took the program back and I became the Food Service Coordinator. "Back in the Day" we would prepare all the food at PHS and two transport vehicles would transfer and serve the meals at Newark, Orfordville Elementary and Footville grade schools. The staff would return to PHS after serving, unload, clean up and prep for the next day's deliveries. At that time we had ten full time cooks, no computers and used lunch tickets. A big hit was the homemade bread we made three times a week.

The District then decided to remodel buildings and invest in our kitchens. Each school's kitchen was remodeled and from that time on food was prepared and served at each school. Life was pretty simple then, while sanitation/cleanliness was monitored closely, nutritional guidelines, portion controls and record keeping were not that regulated. All our fruits and vegetables were canned so sodium and sugar were a non-issue.

Today we use mainly fresh fruits and vegetables with some frozen items. Our "Farm to School" program is a wonderful addition for the District as is the "Breakfast" program at both schools.
Currently we must comply with the State of Wisconsin restaurant food and safety regulations. We are inspected twice a year by the County Health Department and have DPI reviews every three years. The preparation for the inspections, reviews and annual reporting have become very intense. Daily record keeping of operations such as prep temps, transportation temps and serving temps, whole grain, milk, sodium, caloric count and sugar consumption are all part of the reporting requirements so we maintain eligibility for Federal food service reimbursement. All ala carte offerings must meet the mandated "Smart

Snack" approval requirements. These are just a few of the changes that have taken place over the years that have had a huge positive impact on our programs nutritional standards and resulted in a much improved product for our students.

Some of you may be aware that my husband is a 1966 PHS graduate; I have a son who graduated in 1990 and a daughter in 1995. I've also had (7) nephews and (1) niece graduate from Parkview. Now I'm going to show my age, as I have one granddaughter who graduated two years ago, another one graduating this year, a grandson in $1^{\text {st }}$ grade at PES and a granddaughter in $9^{\text {th }}$ grade at PHS. I also have (3) grandchildren in the Janesville district and (1) at Turner. As you can see this district is in my blood and has been for many years
I can't thank my staff and co-workers enough for their wonderful support and friendship. They truly are the roots of this successful program. The best part is the continued friendships and respect I have for current and past employees and the memories we have created through the years.

Several people have asked what we plan to do in retirement. Top priority is family/grandkids. We also plan to spend time in our second favorite place, the Florida Keys, when not at home in Newark.

Again, many thanks to each of you that have supported the food service program over the years. Thank you to the Parkview School District for allowing me the opportunity to hold this position and work with the many talented and dedicated people who followed the Food Service Department's mission and goals for a successful operation. I'm especially grateful to students who are past graduates that share compliments and memories. I wish good luck to the program and hope that the future managers invest the care, commitment and goodwill to the program that our Parkview students and staff deserve.

## PE Grant

PES $4^{\text {th }}$ graders used Makey Makey kits purchased with the grant receive from Carol Aulabaugh last fall to integrate STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) into physical education classes. Each group of three students brainstormed an idea for a project that included PE equipment, other ordinary objects and a Makey Makey kit. Their creations counted baskets made, field goals made in hockey and other items. They turned ordinary objects into counters or game boards. The students worked on their projects for three weeks and then presented them to their classroom teachers, Mr. Greco and Mr. Lutzke, who asked the students questions and tried some of the devices out.
