## Blog – Co-Curricular Activities

My memories of being an athlete, drama participant and coach are extremely pleasant and I know that providing our students with these same opportunities and many more will also leave a lasting mark on them as they grow to be the next generation of leaders that we will need and depend upon.

As an administrator, I have had the opportunity to watch countless events and see our students perform at some of their highest levels. I know that they truly appreciate when individuals come out to see the results of their hard work. These activities kept him involved in school and helped him develop traits that he still uses each day in his adult life. If they would have been taken away from him, I know that his high school career would not have been as rich and fulfilling as it was.

Nevertheless, I need to give a shout out to Pat Abrahamson, our Jr./Sr. High School Assistant Principal and Activities Director. He was able to work with the Brodhead School District to give our students the opportunity to participate in Brodhead High School's show choir. They have to find their own way to practice on Sunday afternoons and to the show choir events, but they can still have the experience, just not as a member of our show choir.
