No-Tax Increase, Operational Referendum on the April 7 Ballot

At the January 20 Board meeting the Parkview School Board approved an operational referendum for the April 7 ballot. The referendum will address the 2020-2023 District shortfall of \$3.5 million and if approved by voters will not increase the school property tax. The reason the April 7 referendum will not increase school property tax is because the current operational referendum drops off at the end of the 2019-20 school year. The new referendum will replace the current 2017-20 referendum.

The April 7 operational referendum is for a period of three years. The 3-year referendum will request \$825,000 in 2020-21, \$1,025,000 in 2021-22 and \$1,150,000 for 2022-23. The revenue from the referendum will fund non-recurring purposes consisting of maintaining instructional technology and curriculum materials, educational programming, expenses associated with bus routes, and funds associated with recruiting and retaining staff.

The District will be holding three meetings to provide information and answer questions about the April 7 Operational Referendum. The meeting times and locations are listed below.

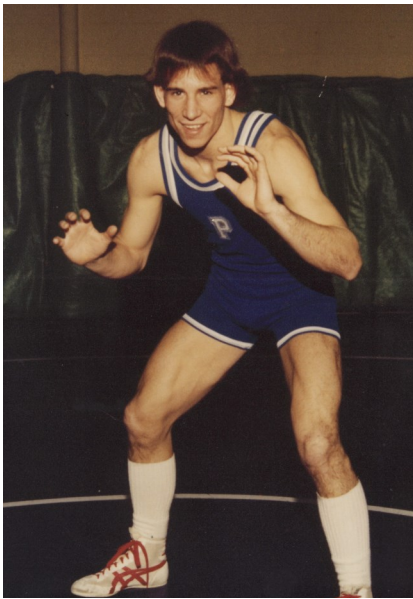

Board Approves 2020-21 District Calendar

The Parkview Board of Education approved the 2020-21 District Calendar at the January 20 meeting. The calendar can be found on the District website (www.parkview.k12.wi.us) by clicking on “District” along the top menu bar and then scrolling down the list and selecting “2020-21 Calendar.”

The 2020-21 school year will begin on Tuesday, September 1. Due to state law, Parkview can't begin the school year prior to September 1, or the day after Labor Day, whichever occurs first. The date for Graduation has not yet been set. Mrs. Stelter will be sending out a questionnaire to parents of current Juniors about the date/time for the ceremony. Stay tuned.

The 2020-21 calendar is very similar to the current District calendar. Students will again have a full week off during Thanksgiving week. Teachers will have professional development on Mon. and Tues. of Thanksgiving week and receive a compensation day on Wednesday for the two evenings of parent-teacher conferences.

The calendar again contains early release days on the first Friday of six of the ten months. The exceptions will be that there is no early release day in September, January, April or June. The early release time provides teachers with a few hours of paid time to collaborate with their colleagues to develop new lessons, and learn new strategies to improve student achievement.

My goal all through high school was to be successful in a career in Law Enforcement. Going into my freshmen year that is all I focused and strived to stay on that path. When I was a Senior, I completed my State Fire Fighter Certification. When I graduated in 1998, I enrolled into the Police Science degree program at Blackhawk Tech College while others were on their way to the Universities chose to stay local to continue my degree while still able to maintain my involvement with the Beloit Police Explorer Post while also working with the Brodhead Police Department as a Community Service Officer & Dispatcher.

In 2000, I successfully completed my Associates degree in Police Science and was accepted into the Sparta, WI Police Academy. After successfully completing 420 academy hours, I obtained my Wisconsin Certifiable status to be able to apply for my long-awaited police officer career.

In 2001, I was offered a Police Officer Patrol position with the Three lakes Police Department in Three Lakes WI. I had set my goal before I was a freshman in high school, and I fought hard to finally land my career position I had always wanted despite some of the obstacles that were in front of me. I was not only entering my long-awaited career; I was also the first female hired on the department.

During my time on the department, I continued to further my education in the Fire service and the EMS service as well. I successfully completed my State Fire Fighter II certification, Hazmat Tech certification, Swift water & Ice water rescues and along with that I was able to achieve my EMT-AEMT license.

In 2006, I married my Husband Joe, and together we continued my love for traveling and I picked up another hobby that turned into a love; scuba diving in which I traveled down to Honduras and obtained my Scuba Instructor certification and later became a Master Dive instructor.

Unfortunately, my career in Law Enforcement came to a screeching halt when I was involved in an on-duty injury from an altercation during an arrest. Several months later I had to receive surgery and

over a year of recovery and rehab. Ultimately, right in front of me was the decision that I never thought I would have to make and that was to end my career in Law Enforcement. Of course, this decision was one of the hardest to make, as I saw myself only half accomplishing my goal. My ultimate Police goal was to achieve the status of a K9 Officer and I knew that would not be in my future. I was devastated but I knew I had a great run in my career. During my time, I was able to fulfill the positions of D.A.R.E. Officer, School Liaison Officer, officer in charge of the Boat patrol and Motorcycle Patrol. I was also the very first female my department had ever hired. All in all, it was a great career run minus the K9 status. Several years later, I chose to go out on my own and become a K9 Handler. I searched for a couple years to find my K9 that I knew I was to have. I traveled to Paoli, Indiana and that is where my life's dream was waiting for me. With saggy eyes, wrinkly skin and four beautiful red paws I had finally found my Bloodhound. Her name, Reba Ole', a pureblooded Bloodhound 8 weeks old with an exceptional bloodline in Mantrailing.

Reba came home with my husband and I. At ten weeks old we began our training to become a Search and Rescue team. She quickly advanced in her training. At just eight months old we successfully had our first find with an elderly man missing in the woods. Reba and her nose excelled. At nine months old, we received a call for a silver alert and traveled to southern Wisconsin. Reba again was able to locate the missing person who had been missing for three days. Unfortunately, this person was deceased, but Reba was able to help bring closure to the family. At that moment I realized I had yet again achieved the goal I set for myself years ago. Shortly after, Reba was accepted on to my Fire Department and we are now the first K9 Search & Rescue team.

Reba and I have traveled to Indiana and obtained our expert level Mantrailing certification and later were accepted into the Florida Public Safety Institution for Bloodhound training in Tallahassee, Florida where we excelled in training and again certified in another level of Expert Mantrailing.

In December, Reba got invited down to Gatlinburg, TN to the Blake Shelton Ole Red Restaurant to take part in the Parade of Lights with a total of 40 Bloodhounds

that were chosen to be in the parade. It was a great experience.

Reba and I continue to train multiple times a week, our training never ends. We train in snow, rain, heat and in multiple jurisdictions. We never know when or where someone's loved ones may need assistance to be found.

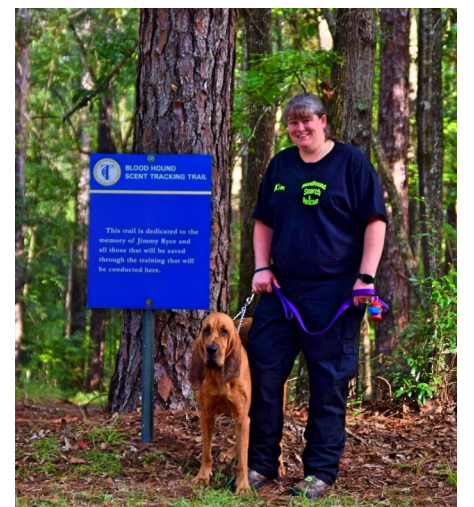
I wanted to share my journey with you. I was not what you say a popular student, but I had a dream and I never gave up on it. No matter the bumps in the roads, the career ending decision and keeping my ultimate dream alive, I was able to achieve it even if it was in a different capacity. I still achieved it and I am excited for what the future holds. Reba and I continue to train every place we go, and we are willing to travel long distance just to provide a free service to aid in the search for your missing loved ones.

We are willing to provide demonstrations to Law Enforcements, school groups, Fire Departments and fundraising events. We would like to continue to show the public what this magnificent breed of dogs can accomplish.

A Message from our School Nurse

It's not too late to get the flu shot!

Although flu season is already upon us, you can still get the flu shot. The Rock County Public Health Department (RCPHD) recommends that everyone six months of age and older receive a flu shot. The vaccine is safe and effective and can prevent long absences from school and work. The vaccine is covered by many insurance companies and you can call the number on the back of your card to verify. Contact your medical provider or stop by a local pharmacy to get your vaccine today.

Signs and symptoms of the flu include:

A 100°F or higher fever or feeling feverish (not everyone with the flu has a fever)

Cough

Sore throat

Runny or stuffy nose

Muscle or body aches

Headaches

Fatigue (tiredness)

Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults

“If you have not received a flu vaccine yet this season, it's not too late,” said RCPHD Health Officer, Noel Sandoval. The flu season in the United States begins as early as October and lasts until May. Every flu season is different, and the flu virus can affect people differently. Even healthy people can get very sick from the flu and spread it to others. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends that everyone 6 months and older who has not been vaccinated yet this season, get vaccinated now.

In addition to the flu shot, community members should practice these 3 C's:

Clean – properly wash your hands often, and frequently clean commonly touched surfaces like door-knobs, refrigerator handles, phones, and faucets.

Cover – cover your cough and sneeze with your arm or a tissue.

Contain – contain your germs by staying home if you are sick. If your child has a fever (100.4 F or greater), muscular pain, or extreme fatigue, please keep them home.

Parent Tech Tips

“Keeping Technology Safe in a Digital World”

According to NPR, 53% of children in the US own a cell phone by the age of 11*. In a digital world where everything is accessible at the touch of a button, parents often wonder, “How do I keep my child safe?”

Often, the danger can hide in plain sight. Police departments across the country are reminding parents to be vigilant, regularly checking their child’s device for potentially harmful content.

“**Calculator%**” is one of the many secret apps used to hide photos, videos, and inappropriate browser history. By disguising itself as a calculator app (similar to the calculator app found on any IOS or Android device), users can easily keep unsuitable content hidden.

Here are a few others to watch for**

Ask.fm (known for cyberbullying, encouraging users to post anonymous questions to strangers)

Bumble (similar to ‘Tinder’, this dating app requires women to make the first move. Kids have been known to create accounts by falsifying their age, allowing them to communicate with older adults)

Grindr (dating app geared towards LGBTQ community which uses the phone’s GPS to locate the user)

Tik Tok (users create short videos online, exposing themselves to explicit content)

Whisper (similar to ‘Ask.fm’, users post anonymous comments/questions. The app promotes sharing secrets with strangers)

Here are a few ways to avoid having your child fall victim to these threatening apps:

Have a conversation with your child about what apps they are currently using on their phones. Ask questions like:

“Using your phone, how do you communicate with your friends?”

“Do you share things online you would not share in person?”

“Is there anything you would change about your technology habits?”

Approve every app on your child’s phone (Make sure to ask questions if you don’t recognize the name!)

Check the privacy settings on the device. Frequently, apps are using location services in the background without the user being aware.

With the whole world in our hands, phones allow our children to stay connected, seamlessly communicating with those around them. As parents and guardians, it is our job to make sure they’re doing it safely!

TikToc

On the iOS store, TikTok is listed as 12+. On the Google Play Store it is rated as ‘Parental guidance recommended’. When signing up for the app, it’s possible to lie about your age without any form of verification. As children scroll through their feed, most of the videos they’re likely to come across are lighthearted or funny takes on dance routines which are designed to make people laugh. However, there has been a slew of videos which have been reported for featuring drug and alcohol abuse, self-harm and sexual content, including young teens dressing overtly sexually and behaving suggestively. Given the deluge of material uploaded to TikTok every day, it’s impossible to moderate everything and it can be quite common to come across explicit content on the ‘for you’ feed when logging into the platform.

Online Predators

As a social network, TikTok makes it easy to connect with other users. This includes the ability to comment on and react to other user’s videos, follow their profile and download their content. Be aware that by default, any user can comment on your child’s video if their account is set to public. Most interactions are harmless enough but as an app, TikTok is prone to predators because of the abundance of younger users.

Ok Fame

TikTok is very image focused and there is a notable preoccupation with appearing cool and attractive. Many teenagers now attempt to go viral and become what’s known in-app as ‘TikTok famous’. TikTok (and its predecessor musical.ly) has spawned its own celebrities – social media stars Loren Gray and Jacob Sartorius have been catapulted to fame through their initial exposure on the app. Obviously, most budding influencers looking to become the next big thing will be disappointed, but this may have the knock-on effect of making them go

The Cat's Pajamas are five high energy singers who create all the sounds of band using only their voices. The group was formed in 2005 by Brian Skinner whose passion and drive for performing and music production is the heartbeat (and drumbeat) of The Cat's Pajamas. The original members had previously worked together in college groups at the University of Wisconsin, such as the Wisconsin Singers and a cappella groups the MadHatters and Redefined. The first time the Cats Pajamas ever performed together was for the 2005 Oreo Cookie Jingle competition. They then recorded a demo and searched everywhere for gigs until their first big break when they were offered a six-month stint on Celebrity Cruise Lines as the in-house a cappella group. After their first contract The Cats Pajamas moved on to be hired as guest entertainers by Norwegian Cruise Lines. The Cats performed 40 weeks a year onboard NCL from 2007-2009, and quickly became their highest rated act. The Cats also found themselves on America's Got Talent and The Next Great American Band. After three years of perpetual cruising and touring on land, in the fall of 2009, the Cat Pajamas decided to move down to Branson, Missouri. Since the move they've been performing over 200 shows a year! In the fall of 2011, they reached millions of new viewers when they performed on NBC's hit show Sing Off. They were hand-picked by the amazing Andy Williams himself to continue his legacy at his Moon River Theatre. They were chosen to be a part of PBS' TV special "Doo Wop Generations" which aired nationwide in March of 2018. The group was also selected to sing on Broadway as part of an a cappella competition at the Al Hirschfeld Theatre after an evening performance of the hit musical "Kinky Boots".

I asked how the weather compared to her home country and she said it is always warm there. She doesn't mind the cold though because she has nice warm clothes.

Her favorite American foods are mac and cheese and Culvers. The foods she misses most are her mom's homemade soup, and the bread and pretzels they have in Germany. 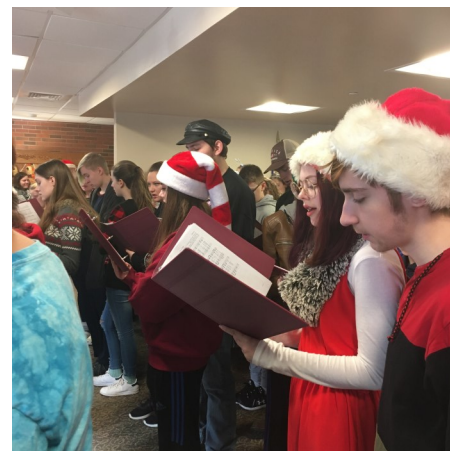
Terry and Zondra Morris have hosted AYA students for the last three years, so I asked them to say something about hosting that might help a family know what to expect if they were considering hosting.

Transportation costs rose sharply for this school year, and the added cost of another bus would be \$28,623.60 for the remainder of the 2019-2020 school year. Keeping the 10th bus in the schedule will add \$47,787.17 to the existing transportation budget. This is proposed to take effect 1/21/2020. Discussion continued with suggestions of how to increase efficiency on the existing bus routes without adding a new revised route to the schedule. Trying to shorten the wait time (30 seconds per individual pick-up) at each stop is difficult at best, as ‘things happen’ every morning at nearly any pick-up point. Someone is running late, and the result multiplies with each rider who gets on the bus late. **Motion** by Zach Knutson, 2nd by Jennie Krajeck to: Approve the Recommendation to: Add a 10th Bus to Reduce All One-Way Bus Times Below 60 Minutes. All in favor voted “Aye”, none opposed, **Motion Carried 7-0.**

15.2 Discuss/Action Regarding Securly Internet & Computer Filter/Monitoring: Dr. Lutzke briefed the Board on a proposal to secure a different Internet filtering/monitoring service for the District. Parkview has been using a portion of this company’s software for a month, and have found it quite efficient, with positive reviews from the Pupil Services team. A three year contract would cost the District \$10, 312.00. which is a savings over purchasing an annual renewable account.
