## January 20 Referendum Request Will Ask the Board to Approve a Resolution for a No-Tax Increase, \$3 million, 3-year Operational Referendum on the April 7 Ballot

 By Steve Lutzke, District AdministratorThe Parkview Administration will present a resolution for a $\$ 3$ million 3-year operational referendum at the January 20, 2020 Board meeting that if approved by voters is projected to hold the school district portion of the property taxes at their current level. The reason for recommending the operational referendum is based on projected budget deficits in excess of $\$ 1,000,000$ for 202021, 2021-22 and 2022-23.

The current operational referendum drops expires at the end of the 2019-20 school year and as a result, if a new referendum is not passed, the District portion of property taxes will go down. A new $\$ 3$ million referendum will not increase the school district portion of the tax bill because of the current referendum falling off and a decrease in the tax rate.

Because there are many unknown budget variables controlled by the State government, it is not possible to guarantee that the school portion of the tax bill will not increase in future years, but district projections show that a $\$ 3$ million 3-year referendum will not increase the average taxes a resident will pay. It is anticipated that any changes the State may impose over the next few years will only minimally impact the amount of tax attributed to the proposed $\$ 3$ million 3-year operational referendum.

All Parkview residents are encouraged to attend one or more of the informational meetings to provide feedback regarding important budget decisions that need to be made by the Board regarding the 2020-2023 budget. The meeting times and locations are listed below.

## Parkview Exceeds Expectations on the 2018-19 District Report Card

Parkview School District's 2018-19 WI Department of Public Instruction report card score of 79.3 out of 100 ( 4 out of 5 stars) was the highest district score for any district in Rock or Green County. If you are interested in reviewing Parkview's report card in detail or that of another district, please go to the following site https://apps2.dpi.wi.gov/reportcards/home.

Specifically, the Parkview School District earned four (4) stars out of five (5) on the state report card from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction, issued for the 2018-19 school year. Based on the star rating, Parkview School District exceeds expectations for educating students. Report cards are issued based on four priority areas: student achievement in English language arts and mathematics, student growth, closing gaps between student populations, and measures of readiness for graduation and postsecondary success.

Each school in the Parkview School District also received an individual state report card score. Parkview Elementary earned four (4) stars out of five (5). Parkview Senior High also earned four (4) stars out of five (5) on state report card from the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction. Based on the star rating, PES and Parkview SR High exceed expectations for educating students. Parkview Junior High earned three (3) stars out of five (5), missing the exceeds expectations category by .3 points. Based on the star rating, Parkview JR High meets expectations for educating students.

Parkview administers several internal assessments throughout the year to monitor student achievement and target instruction to identified growth areas. The teachers and administration in each school have analyzed the results provided in the report cards and are using the information along with the results from internal assessments to continue advancing the achievement level for all students. The results from the internal assessments are consistent with the results shown on the state report cards.
It is the goal of the District to move each school and the district to the 5-star level for 2019-20.

Parkview Tech Integrators Present... Parent Tech Tips "Connecting Without Technology"<br>By Nikki Lutzke, Parkview Tech Integrator

One of my new favorite traditions at my mother-in-law's house involves a basket at the door. Her house rule is simple: leave the cell phones in the basket and build relationships the old fashioned way, "Talk to each other".

Let's face it. We've all seen families in public, eating a meal together but focused intently on their phones. Together...yet independent of one another.

Maybe this family is yours.
If your New Year's Resolution is to reconnect and recharge your relationships without the technology, here are a few ideas for families in 2020...

- Establish "tech free" times/zones. For instance, when the family is gathered for dinner, devices need to be put away.
- Monitor your child's screen time. Talk together about what is a "fair" amount of screen time outside of school. Set goals. Don't be afraid to use your parental controls to monitor this and turn off devices.
- If screen time is going to happen, encourage that technology is to be used to bring family members together. A video game between siblings...listening to music together or watching a movie or show together would all be a great use of technology to connect...not isolate.
- Notice patterns in your child's technology usage. Most of us reach for our phones when we are bored. Insist that your child carve out spending time with friends or getting out to do something (organized team activities or outdoor play) versus searching for something to do on their devices. Plan a family game night or playdates to avoid falling into the "I'm bored" trap.
- Avoid handing young children your devices to soothe them or appease them. Opt for "classic" options like small toys and books, crayons and paper, or verbal games (I Spy).
- Consider what you feel you must post on social media and when you are willing to let "casual relationships" interfere with your family's time. Set parameters for your children and yourself. Does everybody need to see the meal you cooked for your family? How important is it that friends of friends see your child's reaction to their first bite of lemon? Be a guardian of your family's time and privacy.

Changes like these take time, planning, and effort. Ultimately, you, the parent, are key to making changes in your family's technology usage. Model how you want your children to use technology.

Wrestling hard but were not able to win Grant McMahon \#138, Tom Kuffner \#152 and Gage Everson \#220. We forfeited the \#170 weight class.
December 7 we divided the team up to get quality matches for everyone. We sent twelve to the Blackhawk Invitational (Varsity) and six to the Bigfoot Invitational (JV).
It was an exciting day for all at Blackhawk battling our way to the top one match at a time, we were able to finish in 3rd place out of 10 schools missing 2 nd place by just 2 points and taking home this group of kids first team trophy ever.
Not only was this our first tournament of the year, this was also the first time for several of our wrestlers to step onto a mat at the Varsity level and they certainly did not disappoint.
We were looking for some good solid matches to knock the rust off the guys. The team stepped up and came through with some impressive wins. Having three freshmen on the squad and knowing the big change from youth to high school with the leadership from the upperclassmen did help them with each one coming home with a varsity medal!
Junior Korben Brown at 152 was able to pick up from last year's success and come home with a championship medal! $4-0$ on the day with a first round bye he made quick work as he wrestled three matches and spent less than 3 minutes on the mat receiving pins in each one.

Sophomore Camron Duncan at 113 had a full day of wrestling went $4-1$ with a five man round robin. He wrestled some good matches and was able to improve his placement from last year with a 2nd place finish!
Freshman Evan Suer and Senior D.J. Sickels also had a full day with each having a five man round robin, both going 3-2 on the day. Evan at 106 worked hard and came away with some good wins to start the year. He recorded the quickest pin of the day and of the year at 8 seconds! D.J. was very aggressive coming out with great pins and both of them placed 3rd.
Juniors Matthew Mendez at 126, Lucas Vonderhaar at 132 and Gage Everson at 220 all went 2-2 on the day in the 16 man bracket. With strong wins in the second round insuring them a top four finish. With the guys pushing it hard we had a short practice Friday to keep everyone healthy and ready for the team dual meet.

Heading into Waterloo knowing that we had a great shot at winning this as a team, the guys were well rested and ready to go. With two teams dropping out we were left with a 4 team round robin. Our first dual was against Sun Prairie. We started the day at 220 so going into the dual we were down 12-0. We then evened the score with two forfeits from them with Evan Suer, at \#106, and Camron Duncan at \#113. The only wrestler we weren't able to get a match for was Paul Keintz. He has been working hard and I'm looking forward to him getting back out on the mat.

This tournament win was a real family effort everyone had a part in it. The long hard practices (which I actually like LOL) do pay off and when we come together no one will stop us. Thank you to the parents and fans that showed up to cheer them on. And to the managers, Dynally Mould and Elle McMahon, your work to keep us in line is awesome. Also a big thank you to the coaches Josh, John and Byron as your dedication to this program is a pure blessing.

We will be off for a couple weeks. Our next action will be on January 7th, home dual vs Johnson Creek and Palmyra-Eagle. Hope to see you there!
