Parkview Committed to Keeping Students and Staff Safe

A new school year brings with it a great deal of anticipation and excitement. To ensure that all students are able to focus on learning, Parkview is adopting new strategies to ensure the safety of all. As required by 2017 Wisconsin Act 143, Parkview and the Orfordville police dept. are collaborating to take extra efforts to keep our schools safe.

Act 143 requires individuals, including all school employees, to report to law enforcement by telephone or personally any serious and imminent threat to the health and safety of a student, school employee, or the public made by an individual.

I'm sure you share my hope that threats of violence directed towards our schools will never occur. However, in the event that a threat is made, the school district will rapidly respond to make sure that all students, faculty and staff are safe. As a result, any and all reported threats of violence will be taken seriously and fully investigated. If deemed credible, law enforcement will be asked to assist.

Please take time to talk about this topic with your students. It is important for everyone to know that statements or comments that may be interpreted as threats will be acted on and could greatly affect an entire school, family or individual. It is especially important to know that posts or comments on social media, even those intended to be jokes, may result in mandatory reports and criminal action.

Let's all work together to ensure an enjoyable, engaging and safe school year!

Mercyhealth Offers Medical School for Teens

Mercy Health is offering a "Medical School" for teens on Mondays from October 14 – December 9 at 6-7 p.m. or 7-8 p.m. Cost is \$30. The sessions will be held at Mercyhealth South, 849 Kellogg Ave in Janesville. This is for anyone age 14 -21 who is considering a career in health care or interested in learning more about the human body.

Topics covered include:

Introduction to medicine – career opportunities in the medical field, types of schooling needed, as well as classes that will help prepare you for a career in medicine

Neurology – basic parts of the human brain as well as which parts of the brain is responsible for memory, sight, feeling and movement, hands-on dissection of a sheep brain

Pulmonology – basic anatomy and physiology of the lung system as well as different diseases that affect it, hands-on experience in evaluating lung function

Emergency medicine –basics of suturing, including the different knots and instruments used, hands-on opportunity to suture pig feet

Musculoskeletal – learn how many bones are in the human body and how the bones work with muscles to provide movement, learn about x-rays and how we evaluate for broken bones, as well as application and removal of casts

Gastroenterology – examine organs that help digest food and what they look like, hands-on evaluation of a colon using a sigmoidoscopy

Cardiology – illnesses of the heart, as well as blood supply and circulation with an introduction to high fidelity human patient simulation, hands on opportunity to see, feel and identify different parts of the heart, meet in the simulation lab in the Pre-hospital and Emergency Services Center (MercyCare Building)

December 9 is a "scrub in for surgery" at the Mercyhealth Hospital and Trauma Center

Peer Pressure: What Can Parents do?

- Remind your child to walk away from situations...especially dangerous ones.
- Encourage your child to hang out with friends who share the same values and positive attitudes.
- Coach your child to set goals and stay focused.
- Help your child realize that everything they do will have an impact on their future.
- Communicate that students should not compare themselves to others.
- Tell your child to use humor when saying no.
- Help your child realize they have to live with the consequences of their actions.
- Encourage them to join positive extracurricular activities like youth groups, school or community-based sports, community service or part time employment.
- Be the devil's advocate so they listen to their conscience and decide for themselves what they think is right and wrong.
- Always communicate that if they're finding it difficult to handle negative and ongoing peer pressure, to talk to someone they trust such as an older sibling, a favorite teacher, a school counselor or a coach.

What's new at Parkview Elementary School? Social Emotional Learning!

From your school counselors

What is Social and Emotional Learning (SEL)?

CASEL defines social and emotional learning as the process through which children and adults understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions. There are 5 SEL competencies that your students will learn throughout the school year:

1. Self-awareness - recognizing feelings and managing anger
2. Self-management - handling emotions, setting goals, and dealing with obstacles.
3. Social awareness - developing empathy and taking the perspective of others.
4. Relationship skills - saying no to negative peer pressure and working to resolve conflicts constructively.
5. Responsible decision making - and following through. This includes considering long-term consequences of your actions for yourself and others.

What does SEL look like at Parkview Elementary School?

Teachers will be incorporating SEL into their daily lessons. Students in Kindergarten-6th grade will be in SEL families on early release Fridays for bigger SEL lessons. There are also a variety of SEL posters around the building to remind students what the expectations are.

What are the SEL Families?

All K-6 students at Parkview Elementary will be a part of a family made up of students from all grade levels. Students will not be in the same family as their classroom teacher. Students will be in their families for a couple of hours on early release Fridays. They will be participating in a variety of SEL activities.

10 Things You Can Do at Home

1. Focus on strengths.
2. Follow up with fair, realistic consequences for misbehavior.
3. Ask your child how they feel.
4. Find ways to stay calm when angry
5. Avoid humiliating or mocking your child.
6. Be willing to apologize.
7. Give children choices and respect their wishes.
8. Ask questions that help children solve problems on their own.
9. Read books and stories together.
10. Encourage sharing and helping.

7. ATHLETIC DIRECTOR’S REPORT: Shane Suehring provided a written report, but was unable to attend the meeting. Mary Stelter highlighted portions of his report. Spirit Squad has a new coach - Kim Fancher; Volleyball JV2 has a new coach - Terri Peterson; HS Football team has 30 members, and the football season fundraiser was a “huge success”. See his report.

8. DIRECTOR OF PUPIL SERVICES REPORT: Todd Greco provided a written report and highlighted: 1) Hired a new Special Education teacher Jessica Keehn at PES; 2) Met with our CESA2 Rep to discuss and schedule Professional Development Training for Non-Violent Crisis Intervention; 3) Filed the mandatory DPI seclusion and restraint report for the 2018-2019 school year; 4) Attended Adolescent Mental Health training (provided by the Dept. of Justice) in Edgerton with Dr. Lutzke, Ms. Wilson, Ms. Kempthorne, Ms. Nelson, Ms. Braukhoff, and Ms. Daguanno. Don Bomkamp asked about the status for threat assessments. Todd responded that we are currently using the FBI/DOJ program that was provided by Karen Strandt-Conroy. Todd Greco will chair the Threat Assessment Committee. See his report.

9. DIRECTOR OF CURRICULUM, INSTRUCTION & ASSESSMENT REPORT: Jen Bowers provided a written report, and highlighted the following items: 1) Parkview will be hosting PSAT exams on 10-16-2019. This

is a qualifying exam for a National Merit Scholarship, and is the first time we have offered this in-house; 2) A trainer from ‘Amplify’ (an instructional resource company) provided ELA (English Language Arts) training for 15 staff members on 8-14 & 8-15. Teachers and Specialists from K-5 will receive CKLA (Core Knowledge in Language Arts) the training later in August. Karen interjected that Jen Bowers had recently received a National Award in recognition for her work in promoting the use of the EduClimber student progress tracking program. See Jen’s report.

1) Recognition for Tjark Sattler (and his wife Jordan), for his receiving State recognition from WAAE (Wisconsin Association of Agricultural Educators) for “Outstanding Young Member” award; 2) Blackhawk Technical College - Dual Credit courses: Mary made 6 trips to BTC (Blackhawk Technical College) on July 24, 2019 to get students registered for their dual credit courses. Classes will be taught at Parkview, but students with a passing grade will earn BTC credits; 3) Manufacturing Day - sponsored by BTC is coming up on October 3, 2019. Mr. Luety is able to take 25 students to local manufacturing facilities to experience modern factory workings; 3) CAPP - Cooperative Academic Partnership Program w/ UW Oshkosh is offering courses to Parkview students seeking UW college level credits. Classes all be taught at Parkview, but students with a passing grade will earn UW Oshkosh credits; 4) LifeTrack - Is a service we use to acquire data about students upon graduation from high school, and then at intervals after high school. Mary provided a snap-shot of a two-year response period for Parkview graduates. See her report.

10.1 Discuss/Action on Approval of Budget for Musical - 2019-2020: Mary Stelter and Alyssa Case provided a proposed budget for the upcoming high school musical *My Fair Lady* scheduled for performances on Nov. 8, 9 & 10. A breakdown of production salaries was provided for discussion and approval. One correction involved Director Laura Schuler receiving \$3,500.00 not \$3,000.00 as noted in the budget. Staff members Angela Hawbaker, Caitlin Xavier, and Dave Luety would be paid for assisting in the production. **Motion** by Jennie Krajeck, 2nd by Don Bomkamp to: Approve the Revised Budget for the 2019-2020 musical My Fair Lady. All in favor voted “Aye”, none opposed, **Motion Carried 7-0.**

10.2 Discuss/Action on Stipend Recommendation for 2019-20 Show Choir Season: Mary Stelter and Alyssa Case provided a proposed Stipend recommendation for the 2019-2020 Show Choir season. Alyssa has recruited two assistants, who will be required to attend each rehearsal to help teach the choreography. Motion by Jennie Krajeck, 2nd by Zach Knutson to: Approve the Stipend Recommendation for 2019-20 Show Choir Season. All in favor voted “Aye”, none opposed, Clay Hammes abstained from voting, **Motion Carried 6-0.**

10.3 Discuss/Action on Show Choir Program Cooperative with Albany School District: A recommendation to form a cooperative alliance with the Albany School District to provide an opportunity for Albany students to participate in Show Choir with the Parkview students was discussed. 10.4 Discuss Kindergarten Staffing: Karen provided a review of the current student count for dividing the incoming kindergarten students into manageable groups. She presented three options for Board review. Her options included:

1) maintain current Staffing allocations with three sections (22,22, & 21) for 5K;

2) increase number of Para Educators (Teacher Aides) for any class over 20 students;

3) increase to 4 sections and 4 teachers with 16,16,16,17 students per section. Her recommendation was for Option 2. Adding each Para Educator would cost the District about \$30,000.00 per school year. Moving to 4 sections would require another teacher, another room, more furniture and curriculum to make it happen, and could set a precedent for the class sizes through the 6th grade. The District is not currently staffed or has enough building space for 4 sections of that size through the 6th grade. Discussion followed. See her report and Options for pro’s and con’s. Principal Karen Strandt-Conroy provided a written report, and highlighted the following items:

4) Karen and Jen Bowers attended the eduCLIMBER National User Conference to learn more about how the programs and scorecards work, and how to track student and staff successes and weak points. Karen again noted that Jen received her National Recognition Award from eduCLIMBER;

5) PES Staff members are using a new reading series from ‘Amplify’. New innovative ways to promote reading skills and comprehension; 3) Members of the Science Committee participated in a day long in-service training at the Einstein Project in Green Bay, WI. on July 16, 2019. The Einstein Project is a nationally connected leader in STEAM education methods. See her report.

11. DIRECTOR OF BUILDINGS & GROUNDS REPORT: Jeff Lund provided a written report, and complemented his staff for getting the builds and grounds ready for the new school year. He noted that the new batting cage has not been located yet, but options are being considered. See his report.

12. BUSINESS MANAGER’S REPORT: Tracy Case provided a written report, and deferred to the Action Items listed below.

12.1 Discuss/Action on 2019-20 Support Staff Substitute Pay Rates: Tracy provided a review of the previous year’s rates, and led a discussion about comparisons with other local districts Support Staff Substitute pay rates. **Motion** by Don Bomkamp, 2nd by Tina Suiter-Meyers to: Approve the 2019-20 Support Staff Substitute Pay Rates. All in favor voted “Aye”, none opposed, **Motion Carried 7-0.**

12.2 Discuss/Action on After School Child Care: Tracy led a discussion regarding a proposal for providing an After School Child Care benefit to staff members who are called to attend Administrative or IEP/504 meetings, and have children in Carol Olson’s After School Child Care facility. It was agreed that small children and administrative meetings don’t always work well together. A system of checks and balances was proposed to monitor usage, and that it would provide an added benefit to staff members with small children. \$15.00 per use until 6:00 p.m. was proposed. Motion by Don Bomkamp, 2nd by Jennie Krajeck to: Approve After School Child Care benefit for Staff members attending Administrative or IEP/504 meetings after regular school hours. All in favor voted “Aye”, none opposed, **Motion Carried 7-0.**
