Rock County Public School Districts Working Collaboratively on Fall 2020 Plans

10 districts meeting regularly, joined by the Rock County Public Health Department

Parkview School District—Ten school districts in Rock County are working collaboratively to formulate plans/procedures for reopening schools for the 2020-2021 school year. The Superintendents of the 10 districts meet weekly via web conference call, joined by representatives from the Rock County Public Health Department. With the uncertainty brought on by the COVID-19 public health emergency, the leadership of these districts believe it is essential to work together to bring consistent recommendations to their respective Boards of Education.

While Governor Evers' public health emergency declaration ordered all Wisconsin schools closed through June 30, 2020, the guidance from federal, state, and local health officials is less clear with respect to the reopening schools in the fall. The collaborative planning effort involves the Superintendents from the following school districts:

- Beloit School District
- Beloit-Turner School District
- Bigfoot Union High School
- Brodhead School District
- Clinton Community School District
- Edgerton School District
- Evansville Community School District
- School District of Janesville
- School District of Milton
- Parkview School District

The 10 districts are closely monitoring the situation and are preparing for how school will look/operate in the fall. Their coordinated planning effort will look at a variety of topics/issues related to reopening schools for the 2020-2021 school year, including academics; athletics; community needs; and the health and safety of students, staff, and families. 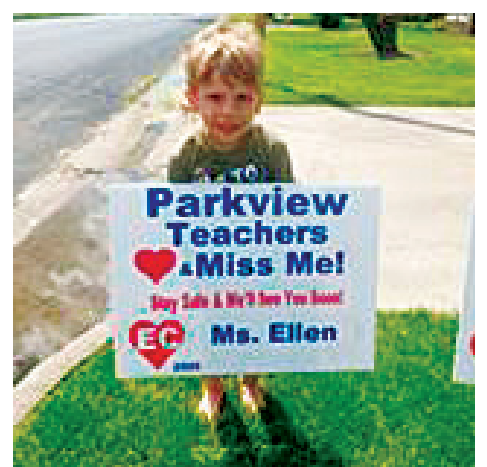

school building in September, but DPI cautions the school calendar, school day and activities will most likely be quite different than they were prior to the Pandemic. To date, DPI has not provided firm directives or guidance but has urged school districts to develop multiple plans for re-opening school for the 2020-21 school year.

To that end, Parkview administration is developing a variety of re-entry plans for the 2020-21 school year. One plan will be returning to a normal, Pre-Pandemic school day. Another plan will be a blended plan of in-school and virtual learning where students don't attend each day. A third plan, where students only participate in virtual learning, is also being developed. Each plan will include teaching and learning expectations as well as plans to ensure the health and safety of each student, staff and visitor. It's likely a final plan will not be possible until late July or early August. Administration will do its best to communicate the final plan as soon as possible.

Lastly, summer school in the school buildings is scheduled for Aug. 3-14 from 8:00-3:00. Information and registration information will be coming to your home very soon. We look forward to seeing your students at summer school!

8. ATHLETIC DIRECTOR'S REPORT: Shane Suehring provided a written report and highlighted the following items:

1) #Be The Light Movement - on 4-17-2020 a nationwide show of support for all students, extra-curricular participants, and 2020 Seniors was held at Parkview Athletic Field. The Football Field lights were lit from 8:00 to 8:20 P.M. along with other schools across the country. Shane said there was a good community turn out, and counted thirty cars in the parking lot at one point during the lighting.

2) The Parkview Coaching Staff have been utilizing the NFHS (National Federation of High Schools) Learning Website to take professional development courses during the last couple weeks. 21 coaches have completed over 100 courses offered on this free online resource. See his report. He then deferred to the Action Items listed below.

8.1 Discuss/Action on Spring Sport Summer Events: Shane briefed the Board on his recent efforts to determine if there is any possibility of the Regular Spring Sports (i.e. Golf, Baseball, Softball, and Track & Field) being held in the summer months. Discussions with other district Athletic Directors, the WI-AA, and coaches have led to the recommendation that the spring sports season will just be canceled for this year. The restrictions for large gatherings, practice times, competition from other schools in our league, and player/coaches availability make this nearly impossible. So far, the Fall sports program has not been affected (if we are back in school). Discussion followed. Motion by Chuck Hagmann, 2nd by Dianne Myhre to: Approve the Recommendation to NOT have Spring Sporting events in the Summer months. All in favor voted “Aye”, none opposed, Motion Carried 7-0.

8.2 Discuss/Action on Spring Sport Letter Awards: Shane briefed the Board regarding the issuing of Spring Sports Letters to the potential Spring Athletes. He has been in contact with other districts, and the general consensus runs either to give a letter to everyone who signed up (even though they didn't compete this season), or not to issue any Spring Sports Letters. Discussion followed regarding Athletic Awards that are based on accumulated records and awards (i.e. Coaches Award, Athletic Director's Award, 4 yr Letter Award, etc...). Shane and the coaches agree that they can amend the requirements for this special non-season, and modify the 4yr letter qualification to a 3 yr. letter amount for the 4 yr letter award recipients. Motion by Jennie Krajeck, 2nd by Tina Suiter-Meyers to: Approve the Recommendation to NOT issue Spring Sporting event Letters for the 2020 Spring Season with the Amendments for the other Awards. All in favor voted “Aye”, none opposed, Motion Carried 7-0.

9. DIRECTOR OF PUPIL SERVICES REPORT: Todd Greco provided a written report, and highlighted the following items via a 'ZOOM' virtual meeting telecast.

1). Student Services staff members have been doing a great job during the recent school closure related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Learning Assistance programs and additional staff support are attempting to assist the teachers and students (and parents) get through this stressful time in our school year;

2). School Counselors have been working exceptionally hard to provide on-line assistance and extra local mental health services to families in need;

3). The District has been an area leader in the efforts to maintain continuity for special needs students with IEP (Individual Education Plan) challenges. See his report.

9.1 Discuss/Action on Amended Summer School Recommendation – 2020: Dr. Lutzke and Todd Greco outlined a potential special Summer School schedule that they hope we will be able to implement based on the State and Federal restrictions currently in place regarding face to face education. The proposal was broken down as follows:

PES Aug 3 - 14 from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

PHS Aug 3 - 14 from 8:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. - (2) 1/2 day sessions

PHS Aug 17 - 21 from 8:00 a.m. to Noon (if necessary for make-ups).

We are told bussing would not be an issue as Kobussen Bus Co. is willing to be flexible with us. Motion by Dianne Myhre, 2nd by Tina Suiter-Meyers to: Approve the Amended Summer School Recommendation for the 2020 school year. All in favor voted “Aye”, none opposed, Motion Carried 7-0.

10. PRINCIPALS' REPORTS: Mary Stelter and Karen Strandt-Conroy co-presented an overview of how they have been coping with virtual learning programs at Parkview since the 3-11-2020 Administrative meeting when they started mapping out options to continue education at Parkview if and when the State closed the public schools down.

10.1 Report Regarding Academic, Social and Emotional Support Resources Available to Students/Parents during School Closure: Karen explained how they used information and guidance from WI DPI, and information from a webinar video conference with school districts in Seattle, WA. The Seattle schools had already switched to virtual learning, and were sharing their learning curve with other districts that had the technology to broadcast courses/classes out to their students who were required to stay at home because of the COVID-19 pandemic. Fortunately, Parkview had already invested in the hardware, and much of the software that was needed to continue teaching remotely. We also needed to build our new components and requirements to meet the changing State Standards. Karen went to work to build a new Parkview website that students and parents could navigate through for homework and assistance as needed. The Elementary and High School websites were redesigned so that families with children in either building would find the links for classes/courses in a very similar format, not one way for one building, another for the other building. They tried to maintain site consistency for all grades. Responses from families have been quite extreme. Some feel we are not giving enough course work, and others are asking for less work, and/or more assistance. Most families are grateful for the efforts we are making for their children. Internet service was also an issue, but has been upgraded enough for nearly all our families to get the assignments, and be able to work on them, and be able to get help when needed. Stress management suggestions are readily available on the school website, and we know that many families are really struggling with this added pressure of trying to maintain some sort of 'normality' during this difficult time. “We are here to help.” Our Student Services staff and the Guidance Counselors have been a major help to the teachers and families. The teachers had used some of the technology already, but many had to learn how and what they could send out to their students in a new format that would keep the students engaged in their studies. The teaching staff was brought onboard on 3-16-2020, and given a 3-23-2020 start date for their virtual classrooms. The staff did an exceptional amount of planning and execution. Grades 7-12 may continue using these lesson plans after face-to-face classes resume. Some are continually coming up with new and imaginative ways to keep their students engaged. They have done an excellent job so far. Mary reviewed how they are constantly viewing options to simplify our educational processes, and the importance of providing as much educational opportunity to our students as possible. Every school district is being held accountable for achieving certain levels of academic progress, and documenting their hours of instruction. We don't want to have our students lose their momentum. Our teachers and administrators are very dedicated to trying to help all students succeed. A Family Survey has been put together, and is being sent out for more input on how we can improve our teaching plans, and help the students and parents cope with this situation. Please be patient.

11. DIRECTOR OF BUILDINGS & GROUNDS REPORT: Jeff Lund provided a written report.

There were no questions regarding his report. See his report.

12. BUSINESS MANGER'S REPORT: Tracy Case provided a written report, and highlighted:

1). Food Service Dept. has had their “Grab & Go” meals program up and running through the Seamless Summer Options program. The program is doing very well with many families taking advantage of the free meals during these hard times;

2). The Staff Wellness Committee is continuing to find innovative ways to try and stay mentally and physically healthy during the school closure;

3). The Referendum passed, and we are looking forward to see how our State Aid will be affected by the school closures and lose of State revenue. See her report.

12.1 Discuss/Action on Support Staff End of Year Plan – 2019-2020: Tracy reviewed the 4-1-2020 Board decision to pay hourly workers only through 4-24-2020. The bonus program for those who do work their scheduled hours is not sustainable through 6-6-2020 (the last day of the school year). She then presented a proposal that could help compensate district employees during the COVID-19 pandemic school closure. This proposal has been previously reviewed by the Finance Committee, and would provide a temporary wage structure for Hourly Workers. See the “Going Forward April 27th -June 12th section of the proposal. It was stressed that “Employee Safety is paramount”, and that employees unable or unwilling to work can use paid time off and may be eligible for unemployment compensation. Discussion followed regarding scheduled task, hours, and levels of compensation. Motion by Don Bomkamp, 2nd by Jennie Krajeck to: Approve the Support Staff End of Year Plan - 2019-2020. All in favor voted “Aye”, none opposed, Motion Carried 7-0.

12.2 Discuss/Action on Cell Phone Stipend Increase – 2020-2021: Tracy presented to the Board a proposal to provide better communication options for district employees who use cell phones for work related activities. Currently the District provides a \$25.00 per month stipend to cover a portion of the cell phone bill for those employees who use their cell phones for work related activities. The proposal

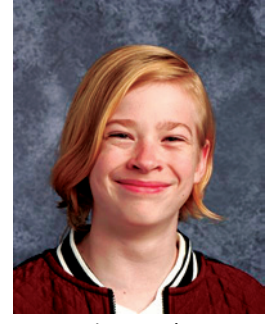
